# MACEDONIA PROJECT

This fall 30 congregations of the NT-NL Mission Area are embarking on a journey together – exploring each other's context for ministry, outreach efforts, and missional practices. The 30 congregations are clustered together in



# Worship, teach, nurture and share Christ's love.



Who Are the Saints in All Saints?

All Saints Day is one of my favorite days in the church year. It "is less about the great historic figures of the church than about people we ourselves have known and revered." (Stookey 1996, 148). It is the ideal time to read not only the names of those deceased in the past year but also perhaps those newly baptized—the new saints in Christ Jesus. It is a day that "emphasizes the unity of the church across time" (ibid), and I might add, across space as well. For most of the world All Saints Day is a big disconnect from culture, but for Christians it holds a special but little understood place in the church year.



A few years ago I was teaching for the ELCA's Division for Global Mission in Slovakia. Near All Saint's Day my husband decided to come for a visit. Now in Eastern Europe, this is an important day. School is dismissed; businesses are closed; churches are packed; families travel many hours and gather for several days to celebrate their Christian traditions. We wanted to take advantage of the school break and make a train trip into the countryside. That All Saints Eve we were in for a surprise as the train jostled along the tracks. In every village, we were privileged to see well-groomed cemeteries banked with beautiful bouquets, glowing in golden candlelight in memory of the saints. It was breath-taking and thought-invoking. It started for me a journey of contemplation.

What made these people—mostly poor--who were struggling from the effects of years of Communism want to spend a large portion of their free income on flowers and candles? What was this connection they felt with the departed and with one another? Was something missing in the celebrations of All Saints Day that I had experienced in the USA? The assigned texts for this day "remind us where we have come from and where we are going" (*Sundays and Seasons* 2007, 292). They emphasize the poor, mourning, meek—not ones we normally think of as being blessed. "God's standards and values may be quite different from those with which we are most familiar" (ibid).

It seems that Jesus has a preference for the poor, hungry, mourning people, "those who have a clearer chance of suffering in this life until all ends in death" (ibid). In Jesus' ministry on earth he is most often drawn to those on the fringe of society—the marginalized of the world—as we have been hearing about in our recent gospel lessons.

What does this call us to as the church? "In a world of enormous need, is it not possible that Christians are called to live a simple life—eschewing the drive in a consumer-driven culture to accumulate—so that others might simply live?" (ibid). We can teach this and model Jesus' actions as the church today. We can do something very real but simple for the needy in our area. Let's take the question that Jesus posed to followers in two recent lessons: "What is it you want me to do for you?" And let's give that question back to Jesus: "Lord, what is it that you want us to do for you here and now in Bosque County?"
